# Devotional & Church News

## Devotional and Church News

This is the so-called "Easter" season. It is, above all else, the most important holy day in the life of a Christian, although its message is preached every Sunday throughout the world. One of the most powerful descriptions of Jesus Christ was written by an unknown author and titled "One Solitary Life." If you have never read this or if you have read it and forgotten the message it brings I encourage you to read it again and cut it out of the paper to display prominently in your home. No other religion has a savior. All the prominent leaders of every other religion have died and never been seen again. Christianity is unlike any other belief system in the entire world all because He lives! Because He lives we, too, will live with Him one day. And that day is coming soon.

### "One Solitary Life"

He was born in an obscure village, the child of a peasant woman.

He grew up in another obscure village where He worked in a carpenter shop until He was thirty.

He never wrote a book, He never held an office, He never went to college, He never visited a big city, He never traveled more than two hundred miles from the place where He was born. He did none of the things usually associated with greatness. He had no credentials but himself.

He was only thirty-three when the tide of popular opinion turned against Him. His friends ran away, one of them denied Him. He was turned over to His

enemies and went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves. While dying, His executioners gambled for His clothing, the only property He had on earth.

When He was dead He was laid in a borrowed grave through the pity of a friend. Nineteen centuries have come and gone and today Jesus is the central figure of the human race. All the armies that have ever marched, all the navies that have ever sailed, all the parliaments that have ever sat, all the kings that ever reigned put together have not affected the life of mankind on earth as powerfully as that one solitary life.

Christianity is about a relationship with a risen Savior. Jesus has had more impact on mankind for good than any other person. Lives have been changed by believing in the historical Jesus Christ. Here are some of the topics people have struggled with who have been helped by the healing power of a loving Christ: drugs, depression, shop-lifting, binge drinking, heart condition, low self-esteem, a life of violence, a lesbian lifestyle, the effects of abuse, searching for meaning, overwhelming darkness. Finding it hard to change? Deep wounds from an abortion? Suicidal thoughts. (This list is far from complete.)

What did Napoleon Bonaparte say about Jesus? Napoleon (1769-1821) was the emperor of France and one of the greatest military commanders of all time. He knew something about shaping history. "I know men and I tell you that Jesus Christ is no mere man. Between Him and every other person in the world there is no possible term of

comparison. Alexander, Caesar, Charlemagne, and I founded empires but on what did we rest the creations of our genius? Upon force. Jesus Christ founded His empire upon love, and at this hour millions of people would die for Him. Everything in Christ astonishes me. His spirit overawes me, and His will confounds me. I search in vain in history to find the similarity to Jesus Christ, or anything that can approach the gospel." (From Josh McDowell's "Evidence That Demands A Verdict," taken from the internet.)

## The Strongest Natural Material Known To Man?

Scientists say they may have found the strongest natural material known to man, one that could be copied to make the cars, boats and planes of the future - the teeth of the humble limpet. They found that the teeth of the snail-like creatures, found on shorelines and in rock pools around the world, are potentially stronger than what was previously thought to be the strongest biological material, the silk of a spider. Because of its

super-strength, spider silk is used in everything from bullet-proof vests to computer electronics, but now scientists have discovered that limpet teeth are potentially stronger. Okay, but those guys obviously haven't tried getting bird poop off their cars!

**2015 Is Going Into Extra Time**

The year 2015 is going to be slightly longer than last year after scientists and officials at the International Earth Rotation Service based in Paris, France, announced that a 'leap second' will be added to atomic clocks this summer. On June 30, dials will read 11:59:60 as the atomic clocks hold their breath for a second to allow the Earth's rotation to catch up

with atomic time.

Atomic time is constant, but the Earth's rotation is gradually slowing down by around two thousandths of a second per day. Some years the Earth runs right on time and no adjustment is needed. The International Earth Rotation Service monitors the planet's rotation and tweaks time where necessary. The first leap second was added in 1972, and this year will be the 26th time a 'leap second' has been added to the atomic clocks. That means that by June 30th, the rotation of the Earth will have slowed 26 seconds since 1972, compared to the time measured by atomic clocks.

Computing systems keep in sync with the world's atomic clocks, but most are not programmed to deal with the unexpected extra second. Software companies are already bracing themselves for problems. When the last leap second was added

in 2012, there were crashes and problems with some major operating systems.
