Recipe Corner

Green Eggs & Ham Crustless Quiche

Ingredients:

- 2 tablespoons whole wheat panko
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 8 spring onions, bulbs and greens - trimmed and minced
- 10 cups baby spinach
- 2 eggs
- 2 additional egg whites
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 cups fat-free evaporated milk
- 1 cup shredded Gruyere
- 1/4 cup dill-minced (or substitute other fresh herbs)
- 1 cup lean low sodium diced ham

Directions: 1. **preheat oven to 350 degrees.** Spray a 9 inch pie plate with cooking spray. Evenly sprinkle panko on bottom of pan and set aside.

2. Heat a large saute pan over medium heat; add spring onions and saute until fragrant. Add spinach in handfuls until wilted. Remove from heat and let cool.

3. In a large bowl, beat together eggs, egg whites, salt, evaporated milk, Gruyere, dill and ham. Fold in cooled

greens. 4. Pour into prepared pie dish. Bake 40-45 minutes, or until just set (center should be a bit jiggle).

Devotional & Church News

We often lament the demise of many virtues that our country was once noted for. One of the most solid foundations of our nation, the central building block of our culture (and any culture for that matter), is the family. The ramifications have had a devastating effect on every aspect of our values, those of our Founding Fathers. Within the scope of the family, that one internal element that held the family together was the time of family worship. I am not talking about gathering spouse and child, marching off to church on a Sunday morning, although that is still important. No. Family worship is much more basic than that. It is the daily practice of setting aside a time once, or even twice, each day for family prayer, teaching and reading God's Word, supplicating to God our sincere desires for the welfare and well-being of each other. How great an example that would be to young children to witness daily their parents respect for the Lord.

Making God important within the family circle was expressed by J. W. Alexander in the mid-1800s in his publication of family worship. Honoring God with thoughts of Him to begin and end each day influences not only families but neighborhoods, churches, countries, the world. Families so in tuned to such devotion are more likely to produce good citizens, future leaders in politics, churches, commerce, industry, military and voluntary services to those in need. Too much is left for

governments to decide. Government, no matter how virtuous, can be neither father nor mother to its citizens. Furthermore, family was the first community ordained by God. Lamentable indeed are those of our brothers and sisters who have been denied by circumstances to experience the love, comfort and security that only a family can provide.

Beyond the borders of our homes is a worldwide community of family. Those of the Christian faith have long recognized this. Jesus spoke of His family as being universally those who followed His teachings, obeyed His commands, and loved as He loves. Jesus is bigger than the United States, more powerful than the atomic bomb, smarter than politicians, wiser than philosophers, more loving than churches, more generous than philanthropists, more holy than religious leaders and closer than a brother. Restoring the lost art of family worship is so very vital to restoring this country to that state of existence when "*God shed His grace on thee!*" Family is the glue that holds the country together. Jesus is the cement that holds the family close to God's own heart. Fathers need to once again take their place as the spiritual head of the family. They need to shoulder that responsibility of leading, teaching and setting a proper example to which they will one day be held accountable. Stop being too busy for God. Worship Him whole-heartedly every day. Take the initiative to gather your family together in sweet surrender to His presence in your life and in your home. Turn off the television, the computer, the cell phone, the iPad and any other source of

disturbance. Let the children give their thumbs a rest. That is my challenge to you. Daily family worship is a condition that I grew up without. My parents were faithful to take us to church each Sunday, for which I am thankful. But they, too, were never exposed to the lasting benefits of daily family worship. Nor can I confess to following this principle in my own family as we raised our children. But I am convinced that its benefits are real. Think of what this country could be if every family in each neighborhood looked to God for daily guidance as they praised, prayed, sang and worshiped Him.

We've had a fond response to our Easter Cantata. Thank you to the choir and the many hours of rehearsal they gave to this endeavor. And we are so thankful that God has gifted many people with the capacity to originate and compose such beautiful musical scores. The Wednesday morning Prayer Meeting and Bible Study will continue through the end of this month. Attendance has been solid and steady. The semi-annual general board meeting will be held on Monday, April 11 at 10:00 AM. God has so many things to teach us as the Holy Spirit opens our eyes. You are invited to join us each Sunday morning at 10:30 AM for worship and fellowship as we work our way through I Corinthians. May God bless all of you and your families.
